

# MECCANO CHAMPIONSHIP COMPETITION

### 21 Cups & 460 Medals: total value £250



URING the past two or three years our annual Model-building Contest has assumed such proportions and has attracted such world-wide interest that we are now able to run it in a form we have long had in mind, and which we think will be greatly appreciated by Meccano model-builders all over the world. For the purpose of this Competition we have divided the various countries into the following groups:—(1) Great Britain. (2) Australasia, South Africa, Canada, India, and all Countries within the British Empire. (3) \*America. (4) \*France, Belgium and Switzerland. (5) \*Scandinavia and Holland. (6) \*Italy. (7) \*Spain and Portugal.

In each of these groups, three Championship Cups will be awarded for the best models submitted, and the winner of each Cup will hold the title of "Meccano Champion" for his particular group and section for twelve months from the date of the awards. The Cups, which have been specially designed for us, are of superb quality, very handsome in appearance, standing over 8-in. in height. Each Cup will be engraved with the name of the winner, and will form a valuable reminder of his prowess and skill. A suitable plinth will be provided with each Cup.

In addition to these special awards, there will be Silver and Bronze Medals in each section and Certificates of Merit to a limited number of other entrants. The total value of the prizes to be awarded will amount to £250.

#### Complete List of Awards

SECTION A.—For competitors under 10 years of age on 15th April next. Championship Cup and the title of Meccano Champion for his group and section for the year commencing 1st July next. 20 Silver Medals. 50 Bronze Medals.

SECTION B.—For competitors over 10 years of age and under 14 years of age on 15th April next. Championship Cup and the title of Meccano Champion for his group and section for the year commencing 1st July next. 30 solid Silver Medals. 100 Bronze Medals.

SECTION C.—For competitors over 14 years of age on 15th April next. Championship Cup and the title of Meccano Champion for his group and section for the year commencing 1st July next. 60 solid Silver Medals. 200 Bronze Medals.

In all there will be 110 Silver and 350 Bronze Medals awarded to the competitors in order of merit, and a number of special Certificates of Merit in each section.

In making the awards the judges will pay special attention to the following points:—

ORIGINALITY.—Special points will be given to those models showing initiative and originality and which are not simply variations of those illustrated in the Manual of Instructions.

CORRECT CONSTRUCTION.—Models which in their details are constructed on correct mechanical and engineering principles will receive higher marks than those which are built incorrectly or carelessly. No special knowledge is necessary to build models correctly other than that which may be easily acquired from the Meccano Book of Instructions.

GENERAL INTEREST.—Preference will be given to those models which are likely to prove most interesting to Meccano users throughout the world. We shall publish the best models in all civilized countries.

#### Meccano Gold Medallist

The competitor who, in the opinion of the Judges, submits the best model in the entire Competition, will be awarded a specially-designed solid Gold Medal, and will be the "Meccano Gold Medallist" for a year. His name and the year in which he gained the title will be engraved on the medal, which will remain his own property.





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#### PLENTY OF "DIAMONDS"

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### Watermarks

OMEONE once said that before valuing a stamp or even placing it in his album, a stamp collector ily "examines both back and front, not only but looks through it and even looks at it edgeways!" The remark was intended to imply that the collector wastes precious time over little details that, perhaps, would not count with the average person.

Stamp collecting is essentially a hobby in which minute details must be considered, however, and such criticisms as that mentioned obviously come from persons who do not understand the hobby. The consideration of details causes wealthy collectors to pay large sums for single stamps. Often £500 is reached in stamp auction rooms, and not very long ago one stamp (the Ic. black of the 1865 issue of British Guiana) fetched as much as 47,000! As the only difference between a common and a rare stamp may be a small matter such as watermark, a size of perforation, or shade of colour-these details must be worth studying.

#### What is a Watermark?

Most stamps, if held to the light, will show some parts that seem more transparent than others. This transparency, which forms an orderly design in the stamp-such as, perhaps, a crown, star, or some initials—is the watermark. It is obtained by making the paper thinner in places, as desired, according to the pattern required.

Stamps are not the only articles with watermarks, and no doubt you have noticed that writing papers and envelopes often have watermarks. In these cases the watermark consists of the name of the maker or, perhaps, the brand of the paper, which may thus be identified, without the name being too prominent.

#### A Safeguard Against Forgery

The use of watermarks on stamp paper is somewhat different, however, for it is principally used as a precaution against forgery. A clever but dishonest printer might copy the engraving of a stamp, and having mixed his ink to the right tint, could print stamps on paper apparently the same as that on which the genuine stamps are printed. You would think that the result was a real stamp-until you looked for the watermark! The watermark is beyond the skill of the forger, and can only be placed on the paper while it is in a semi-fluid state, by passing it under what is called a "dandy roll." On this roller are a number of very fine wires arranged in a pattern. When the paper passes under these wires they make it a little thinner wherever they touch it, and so leave an impression of their pattern on the paper. We may easily see, then, that the person who wishes to watermark paper must be a paper-maker. Very few forgers would be able to make their own paper and, in fact, there is no case on

record in which this has been done. Thus it is that the watermark is one of the chief safeguards against forgery.

The chief interest of watermarks to stamp-collectors lies in the fact that although two stamps may be alike in every respect except the watermark, they are considered to be "different" for collecting purposes, and consequently both stamps must be included in the album. Naturally, it often happens that one watermark is very much more uncommon than another




Fig. 1. Turtles (Tonga)

Not every stamp has a watermark, however, and in the case of stamps of many foreign countries no watermark is the rule, rather than the exception. Practically all the stamps of the British Empire have watermarks, the only notable excep-tion being Canada, which has not had a watermark for some time, and several of the Indian Native States

#### Watermarks of Great Britain

If we examine any current stamp of Great Britain we find that they are all watermarked with a design consisting of a small Crown over the initials "GR"

in script type, with the Roman numeral "v" between. (Fig. 3). This "GvR" stands for Georgius v Rex" which, as every boy knows, is Latin for "George the Fifth, King." A similar Royal Cipher may be seen on any pillar-box placed in position during the reign of King George V. Pillar boxes installed during Queen Victoria's reign had the Crown and "VR" ("Victoria Regina") Cipher and those during the reign of King Edward, the Crown and "EvilR."

All the current stamps up to the 1/value appear on paper watermarked with this design of the Royal Cipher, although there is some talk of this being skered in the

future. The first King George stamps appeared with two watermarks, the Imperial Crown and the simple Royal Cipher, as it is called. The second issue of the 1d. and 1d. stamps was printed on three varieties of paper, watermarked Imperial Crown, simple Royal Cipher and multiple Royal Cipher (Fig. 4) respectively.

The words "simple" and "multiple" require some explanation, as applied to the watermark of the Royal Cipher. The stamps watermarked in the "simple" style have a large number of designs placed close together, one above the other. Thus two designs appear on each stamp, one above another, as may be seen in any current stamp of Great Britain.

multiple "style a large number In the of the designs are placed in rows, each row being near the one above. Thus the centres of the lower designs come opposite the spaces between the individual designs of the upper row, as shown in our illustration.

### Recent Issues

ST. KITTS-NEVIS. TERCENTENARY ISSUE.

To mark the Tercentenary of the colonization of St. Kitts (i.e. St. Christopher), a complete set of stamps of one



type was sued in 1923. The stamps are perforated 14 and all are printed on the new script watermark paper with the exception the 5/- and 1/1values, which

have the old watermark.

The stamps were used concurrently with the existing stamps for this colony and the general issue for the Leeward Islands, to which group the two islands of St. Kitts and Nevis belong. The design is a picture representing Old Road Bay, having in the background Mount Misery and in the foreground a seventeenth century ship. The values are as follows:  $\frac{1}{2}$ , 1,  $1\frac{1}{2}$ , 2,  $2\frac{1}{2}$ , 3, 6d., 1/-, 2/-, 2/6, 5/-, 10/-,  $\sqrt{1}$ . The 10/- stamp was the first stamp of the Empire to appear on green paper with the script watermark.

#### UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. HARDING MEMORIAL.

There is a rule in America that no President shall appear on any of the postage stamps during his lifetime. After

the tragic end of the late President Harding, the authorities at once decided to issue a mourning stamp bearing his portrait. This magnificent stamp, known as the "Harding Memorial," is the subject of our illustration. It is of the value



of 2 cents, and bears the name "Harding" under the head with the dates of the late President's birth and death in the upper corners. The stamp is appropriately printed in black. The likeness is most excellent; in fact it is, in our opinion, the best portrait that has ever appeared upon a postage stamp. Doubtless the plain, white background is a great help, and it is a hint that other countries would do well to follow.

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
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#### The Secretary's Notes

### Meccano Club Helps Hospital



VERY year thousands of new memare enrolled in the Guild, bers and hundreds of eager enquiries are received at Guild Headquarters asking "How can I form a Meccano Club? For some time past I have felt the necessity for giving to Guild members more information than is possible to write in a letter and with this object in view I have arranged to publish a series of articles in the "M.M." These articles will give full particulars of how to form a club and what is necessary to ensure its success, once it has been started.

First of all let me explain how the Meccano Guild came into existence. principals and staff of Meccano Ltd. have

How the Guild Commenced

worked amongst boys for more than twenty years. It cannot be exaggeration anv

say that the number of Meccano boys at the present time runs into millions. We have corresponded with tens of

thousands of them on all manner of subjects in which all boys are interested. We have interviewed hundreds of others and have been the confidants of their hopes, their ambitions, their difficulties and their fears. Through this long and close association with Meccano boys in all parts of the world we have been able to realise what wonderful hearts and brains they have, and how they understand and respond to help given to them.

Before the days of the Meccano Guild, many of these

boys formed little clubs and societies amongst themselves. They repeatedly asked us to organise some form of central club to which they might all look for guidance. Realising the immense responsibility and work entailed by such a step, we delayed any action until we felt that we had the means and facilities for carrying it through successfully. Thus it was not until 1916 that the Meccano Guild came into existence. is pleasing to remember that the Guild originated in the hearts and minds of hundreds of thousands of Meccano boys.

The Guild has one main object, namely, to help every member to become a good man. It aims to do this by making members' lives brighter Objects of and happier; by tering clean-mindedthe Guild ness, truthfulness, am-

bition, and initiative, and by encouraging its members in the pursuit of their studies and hobbies, and especially in the development of their knowledge of mechanical and engineering principles.

The Headquarters of the Guild are located at the Head Office of Meccano I.td., Liverpool. The work is under my control, and I am assisted by a staff of experienced workers. falls the pleasant task of rendering every possible assistance to Guild members, not the least part of which work is the replying to numerous enquiries upon a wide variety of subjects, not necessarily connected with the Guild or even with Meccano.

The Headquarters staff also despatches badges and certificates to new Guild members and special medals and awards for members who show particular merit or aptitude for club work. We give advice to those boys who wish to form new clubs, and co-ordinate the work of existing clubs in various parts of the country, in the colonies and abroad. We assist clubs in the arrangement of

their programmes, furnish all available information generally help, to make each club a success. We ensure the interchange of ideas between all Meccano clubs, and compile the Guild for the Meccano Magazine, the official organ of the Guild. there are now about 150 clubs in this country and overseas, the members of the Headquarters staff find plenty of work to occupy the time!

The name of the club will also have to be decided, the subscription rates fixed, and a programme for the session arranged, including—if desired—Lectures, Concerts, Exhibitions, In the summer months, outings will have to be arranged, and sports, cycle runs, etc., or any other outdoor pastime that interests the members.






