

Buying Packets

N our last issue we discussed what kind of postage stamps to collect in view of the fact that there are so many kinds other than those used for sending letters or packages through the post. We decided that perhaps the best plan is for the young collector to give his first attention to ordinary postage stamps, while collecting also any specimens of the less usual stamps that may come his way. The best way to begin a collection is to buy the largest packet you can afford. You may buy packets of stamps of the kind you want at anything from 1d. to £1,000 or over, so that prices may be truly said to suit all purses! Do not buy a 2/6 packet this week, however, and another 2/6 packet next week. If you do, there are certain to be many duplicates, or second copies, in the second packet. It is better to buy no stamps this week and a 5/- packet next week, so that you will obtain only stamps that may be put in your collection.

Tongue Twisters!

In regard to increasing the size of your collection and the best method of mounting your stamps, we shall have more to say later. At present the main thing is for you to start your collection. Meanwhile, having purchased your packet, do not be in a hurry to buy an album and stick the stamps in. Devote your energies to trying to arrange your stamps into their respective countries by studying them. Read all the inscriptions. Most stamps have the name of the country on them somewhere. even if it is not in English spelling. It the name looks peculiar, try pronouncing it aloud, for you can often find out the name of the country to which a stamp belongs by doing this, and at the same time afford considerable amusement to yourself and friends by trying to pronounce some names such as Djibouti, Cesko-Slovenska, Azerbaijan, Chimborazo, and Kiautschou!

Identifying Names

Not all stamps bear the name of their place of origin in English spelling or even in English letters. With few exceptions, however, all the countries of the British Empire are named in English or in a form almost as easy to read.

Sometimes the name of the country differs on various issues, such as Rhodesia. On the earlier Rhodesian stamps the name appears as "British South Africa Company," a fact very likely to confuse Company, collectors who are unable to find that name in their catalogue. In the album, however, both kinds of stamps are mounted under " Rhodesia.'

"Oranje Vrij Staat" is easy to identify if you follow the hint to try pronouncing the name of the country aloud. Miss out the "j" of "Vrij" and you hear yourself say "Orange Free State!" Another puzzling South African colony is the Transvaal, which appears on its earlier stamps as "Zuid Afrikaansche Republick," or, abbreviated, "Z. Afr. Republick." This is the Dutch for "South African Republic."

Four Chief Groups

It will be found that the stamps of foreign countries may be divided into four main groups: (1) those on which the name of the country is in English spelling or nearly so, (2) those on which although the name is not n English it is in letters of the English alphabet, (3) those on which the name is in a foreign alphabet, and (4) those bearing no name of country.

The first group should offer no difficulty. It is easy to see that " Brasil " stands for Brazil, " Island " for Iceland, " Nederland " for the Netherlands (Holland), " Romania " for Roumania, and so on. Here, again, pronouncing the name aloud is a great

help.

Sometimes the origina name of the country is changed by an overprint. When this is the case the overprinted name is the latest, and therefore the one under which the stamp is to be classified. The term "overprint" denotes some inscription that alters the usage of the stamp, but not its value. On the other hand, a "surcharge" is an overprint that alters or confirms the value of a stamp.

The word "Française" or "Français appears on nearly all French colonial stamps. Do not be too hasty, however,



on overprinted stamp to be classed under Togoland. The original stamp belonged to Dahomey, but also had the word "Francaise" on it.

in calling these stamps French, but look for other names. If the name of another country appears, that is the one to which the stamp belongs. If there is no other name, then the stamp is French. Bear in mind, also, that "Franc" is the name of a coin as well as an abbreviation of " Français."

The South American state of Bolivar. now a part of the Republic of Colombia,

at one time issued postage stamps of its own. The country was called Bolivar in honour of a hero of that name, whose portrait and name often appear on stamps of other countries. Accordingly, whenever you come across a stamp bearing this name, see if there is another name as well; if so, this latter is the heading under which the stamp is to be classified and "Bolivar" is here used as the name of a person only.

without rest. Some of the cars cover nearly 150 miles every day.

miles every day.

The engine develops 60 h.p., and ignition is by both high tension magneto and battery. The petrol consumption is approximately 5 –7 miles to the gallon. The engine also drives a small generator for the lighting. In winter the car is heated by passing the exhaust gases through pipes laid along the sides of the car near the floor. The brakes are applied by compressed air from a small compressor, similar to those used in some motor garages for pumping up car tyres.

These rail-cars are used on branch lines where there is little traffic, because in these circumstances they are more economical than steam locomotives and coaches. It is expected that in the near future larger rail cars will be built. These will have double-swivel trucks, more powerful engines and double-end control.

The Men Who Gave Us Radio-(cont. from page 151) passed a wire, projecting into the space occupied by the filings, but not touching each other. To ordinary electric currents, these filings were a bad conductor, but when subjected to high frequency currents, such as the spark from an induction coil, they instantly became a good conductor. By connecting them in the circuit of a battery and a Morse recorder it was thus possible to make them record signals from a distance.

Branley
Working on this principle Professor Branley, of
Paris, invented (in 1890) his "coherer" which, as we
shall shortly learn, was the detector subsequently
improved and adopted by Marconi.






